From the Pastor...



"The times they are a changing...."--Bob Dylan

When I began my life in the church in 1976 as a long haired teenager, a kid who was desperate for true community and love and meaning in life, the world was a much different place than now. Folks mostly worked 9-5, Monday to Friday. Weekends were time for family and leisure, offering lots of free time for

church activity. Nothing was open on Sunday save the corner convenience store. Home computers were an expensive dream for almost everyone. Phones were actually connected to the wall. Youth sports were one of many options for kids and many of us did not participate.

To do church, to be church, to go to church was easy and culturally supported.

Almost two generations later everything, and I mean almost everything, has changed. Work spills over into seven days, as close as your cell phone. Weekends are crammed full of so many different responsibilities and obligations: work, sports, family, activities, social stuff, etc. Everything is open on Sundays, all the time, 24/7, no boundaries. We carry computers and phones in our pockets. Youth sports and other activities for kids and teens and families have exploded, abound in choices more so than ever before.

And so to do church, to be church, to go to church is a challenge, no longer supported by the culture, even expected by the culture. Churchgoing in fact is now countercultural.

Think about that!

For the past year or so a group of us in the church--the 2020 Task Force--has been meeting to take on and investigate and pray about and think about this reality. The truth we face is this: while we and the world still need to hear the Gospel, the good news, know of God's love, the delivery system for getting that into the culture--the church--friends this has to change. Change in response to a changing world. Because whether or not the church chooses to change--how and when it worships, how it does church school and youth groups, how it does social justice and outreach--the world is going to change FAST, regardless. We see it right now in our church life: in dropping attendance numbers, in lower church school registration for example.

To be clear: I do not think this is happening because of the quality or the goodness of what we are doing or the message we are offering. I believe we are absolutely doing God's work, with a talented hard working staff and a core of committed faithful members and friends! But: the times and the culture and this world--it is changing. The people God is now sending to us to serve: their need for God is not changing but how they are now willing and able to encounter God in community called church: that is changed.

Hence our 2020 challenge. So what do we need to do in the midst of this change? Pray. For the church. For each other. Always.

MODERATOR'S MESSAGE

Are you a good listener? Everyone appreciates feeling valued, heard and understood. And great listeners can make us feel exactly that way. It's something we *probably* all think we do well. But do we....listen....well?

Here's a little listening test.

When someone tells you a story, do you look for an opportunity to jump in and tell them your *own* story? Maybe a better strategy is to listen all the way through and ask a few questions. The person telling the story will probably have more fun sharing with you if they feel that you've paid close attention and cared enough to ask about it.

Are you an interrupter? Or a sentence - ender? Nothing shuts down a person's desire to chat more than the feeling that the other person is going to cut in, or, worse, end your sentence for you.

How about the term "I know." Is that something you find yourself using with some frequency - especially when the topic is the weather or some other innocuous bit of conversation? I think I would prefer to have someone *agree* with me, rather than have them tell me they already know what I am saying. If a person regularly tells me that they know what I am saying, I sometimes doubt whether they are really listening to me.

Are your arms crossed when you converse with someone? That little bit of body language can make the other person feel there is something unpleasant being discussed - and many times that message is sent without it ever being intended.

Some people seem to be liked by almost everyone. I think people who are universally likeable are mostly just really good listeners. They are thoughtful people who listen, remember what they hear, and are considerate enough to follow up and ask about what they have learned. As we enjoy the fellowship within this Christian community which brings us all together, I wonder if we might all benefit from paying attention to, and possibly improving, how well we listen to one another.

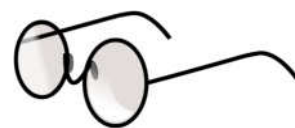


Pilgrim Church 2020 20-20 GROUP*

DEACONS' CORNER...

A few weeks ago, I picked up and read the book Stronger, the story of Boston Marathon survivor Jeff Bauman who lost both of his legs in that attack. In his book, Bauman details his life from injury to walking on his "new" legs. His journey was beyond difficult, but he never gave in to defeat. As he wrote about his recovery in a conversation with his fiancé he assured her that "things are going to get better and better". As optimistic as that was, the quote that really amazed me was "I wasn't angry at the Tsarnaev brothers." What a revelation! He was going through what most of us would find impossible and he wasn't angry.

During our journey through Lent, we focused on Hospitality, Welcoming, Belonging and Peace. Our confirmation class created a Peace-inspired worship service. These eighth-graders shared their thoughts while seventeen votive candles' flames flickered on the altar. Each candle represented a person who lost their life in the Florida massacre. It breaks my heart that those kids and adults in Florida and our young people have to deal with that horrendous event. It seems to me that if all of us could adopt Jeff Bauman's "not angry" philosophy we would get closer to peaceful living.

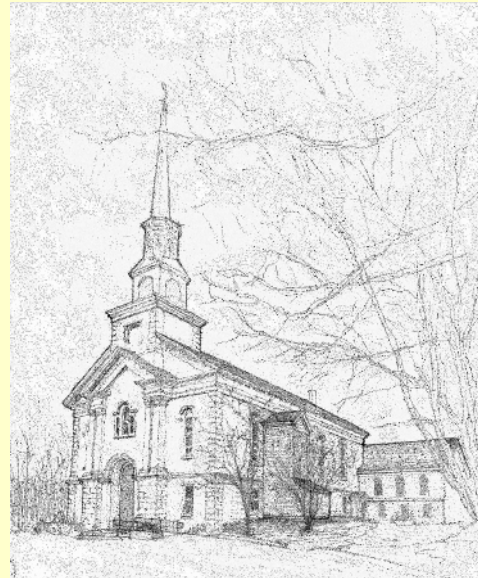

ACCESSIBILITY PROJECT UPDATE

This is the second in a series of monthly reports on the status of the capital project that encompasses a commercial elevator for the sanctuary, an inclined platform lift from the sanctuary to the education wing and improved drainage for the south side of the sanctuary.

During March we met twice with the Sherborn Historic District Committee (HDC). After much discussion and exploration of exterior details the HDC voted to conditionally approve our architect's original design including the layout of structure consisting of the gabled hoistway with adjacent control room as shown in the sketch. They also voted to approve our use of modern building materials for the structure including use of fiber-cement clapboards and Azek (PPVC) trim boards. These materials will serve to make the elevator's exterior more durable and require less frequent painting when compared to wood.

As a result of responding to challenges from the HDC our planned meetings with the four preselected General Contractors (GCs) happened later in March than expected. To date we have met with three of the companies all of who are interested in bidding on the job, have relevant experience with elevator installations on prior jobs and assured us they could start our project by June 1st. Our near term plan for April is to receive the GC bids by mid-month and award a decision by the end of the month.

The 2017 Memorial & Endowment financial summary was inadvertently omitted from the Annual Report but is available at the church office. The summary can be emailed to anyone who would like a copy. You may also find additional helpful information about M&E in the church's Annual Report.

As a reminder, the M&E General Endowment Fund earnings may be used according to percentages voted by the congregation. This year the Congregation voted to change these percentages as follows:

Maintenance, Plant and Capital - from 40% to 50%.
Support of People and Programs - from 40% to 45%.
Reinvested for Future Growth - from 20% to 5%.

On the 13th Annual Advocacy Sunday at Pilgrim Church, dozens of adults and children took the time to sign postcards and cards to our local senators and representatives, the Speaker of the House, and the Governor. Even more postcards were signed by the youth groups. The purpose is to make our concerns for the homeless known to our government leaders.

Postcards targeted key line items in next year's state budget: items that provide support services for the homeless, that help keep people housed so they do not become homeless. One postcard advocated increased funding to provide housing options and support services to unaccompanied minors who are homeless. The Dept. of Education has counted thousands of such children in schools and untold numbers who have already dropped out of school. (You must be 18 to be admitted unaccompanied to a shelter!)

Again we stressed protection for families experiencing homelessness from having to sleep in unsafe places not meant for human habitation. These families need to be admitted to shelter *before* they sleep in such places. Legislators can address this issue both in budget Line Item 4000-0007 and in House Bill 659.

After Advocacy Sunday, packets of cards were delivered or mailed to Representative David Lindsy, Speaker Robert DeLeo, Senator Karen Spilka, Representative Carolyn Dykema, Senator Richard Ross, Governor Baker, and other legislators.

Written communications from constituents allow these legislators to fight for monies to support the homeless and to help keep the nearly homeless housed.

If you participated, know that your words make a difference. Legislators listen when their constituents speak!
