## From the Pastor...



"And it came to pass in those days...."
--Luke 2:1

Time never cares about humans' schedules. Instead time always comes on its own terms. Time cannot be rushed. Time cannot be slowed down. Time can only be experienced as it unfolds and we as humans are immersed in it.

I hope that's not too heavy or philosophical. But the point I'm trying to make is actually pretty simple. As a gift from God, time is wonderful but: we do not have any control over it. All we can do is accept it. I'm acutely aware of time this time of the year, this time in the church year, this time as the natural light wanes and the earth pulls within itself, and we wait for the 25th.

Christmastime: you see that cannot be rushed. I seem to relearn that lesson every year. Post Thanksgiving it can feel as if our world goes into high gear, all of us traveling very fast downhill towards the holiday and the holy day. Quick. IT'S COMING! So much to do and prepare. Presents and a tree and baking and making vacation plans and cards and wrapping....So little time, right? So many things to experience as well: open houses and parties, worship at church and service opportunities too and special music.

It might seem counterintuitive but I think the best way to experience Advent (which comes from the Latin word for 'coming') is to instead slow down. Savor the days as they click by one by one toward solstice and the month's end. Practice doing just one Christmas task at a time and actually enjoying each activity: the hymn that always makes you cry, the joy of assembling a meal in the miracle on 25 South Main Street, the quiet of the street on the first snowfall.

Yes Jesus is coming but not yet. Even though the world wants him to already be here. Nope. Christ comes when he comes--not a minute early, not a minute late, instead on God's schedule, not our schedule.

So my prayer and hope for us in this season of Advent and Christmas is that we wait. We look at the night sky and wonder. We deeply enjoy and be engaged in every holiday thing we do--be alive to it, not just rushing off to the next thing.

O come, O come Emmanuel: just not yet. But he is on the way.

#### Moderator's Message

The time I almost set the church on fire. True story.

I was serving as a deacon a Sunday or so before Christmas. The sanctuary had been beautifully decorated for the season. It looked lovely, as it always does. That particular year, a string of garland had been placed on the little shelf above the alter.

Toward the end of the service, we seemed to be without an acolyte. So I jauntily picked up the candle lighter / snuffer and set out to extinguish the candles. Now, we all know that the proper technique is to put out the first candle, light the candle lighter from the one that is still burning, and then snuff it out as well. After that has been completed, one turns to face and walk through the congregation with the flame, signifying our desire to carry our light and our faith out into the world

I extinguished the first candle, and lit the candle lighter from the second. That is when the problem arose. The candles that week, for some reason, were not sitting in the front, center of the alter. Rather, they had been placed against the back wall, an important fact I did NOT discover until I snuffed out the second candle, thereby placing an open flame directly into the green Christmas garland resting on top of the alter wall.

In what was one of the least pleasant sounds I can ever remember hearing, the garland immediately began to crackle. It was almost instantaneously on fire. I heard the congregation behind me gasp. Before the magnitude of what I had just done settled into my brain, I turned

the lighter over and used its bell to began damping out the fire in the garland. I used the snuffer three, four, five times, and each time, miraculously, it worked. It actually smothered the fire, leaving little glowing red bits that darkened as they cooled. I turned toward the congregation, and let out a huge sigh of relief, made the OK finger sign, and walked out. Polite, nervous, applause followed me out.

The teasing began immediately. And happily so. Had I not succeeded in extinguishing the blaze, we would have had a problem far too big for teasing. We also had a chance to review our safety practices, our fire exit strategies, and the placement of fire extinguishers throughout the building. So truly, no harm came from this scary incident. Maybe, even, a little bit of good.

I make it a daily practice to focus on the ways in which my life has been blessed by God. I can find something small but meaningful every day. But there are days, occasionally, when it is hard to identify a little miracle; days when I might feel low or discouraged. That's when I remember my personal Christmas miracle, and thank God all over again for the way in which he has directed my life.

May God bless you all with a rich Christmas season filled with love, laughter, joy, and the peace of Christ.

#### Church Accessibility Project Update

This is the eighth and last in a series of reports on the status of the capital project that encompasses a commercial elevator for the sanctuary, an inclined platform lift from the sanctuary to the education wing and improved drainage for the south side of the sanctuary.

Success! November saw the completion of the elevator installation as well as the inclined platform lift. We were aided in solving the interface issue between the elevator alarms and our building's aging central alarm system by our new alarm maintenance company Phoenix Security Systems. Earlier in the month the incline platform lift was certified by a State inspector. And in late November the elevator itself was also certified by a State inspector so our project is now fully operational and ready for use by churchgoers. In the upper photo is Don Jusseaume, project supervisor for the general contractor, R.P. Valois Inc., shown next to Jim checking out the new elevator. The elevator is self-operated and easy to use. Identical to that found in most office buildings, the new elevator is always available for use and no longer requires assistance from the Deacons.

In the lower photo Thurza Campbell is taking the inaugural ride on the inclined platform lift. The lift, while designed to be self-operated, is somewhat more complicated to operate because of the separate controls to raise and lower the safety bars and to move the lift up or down the ramp. The Church staff is being trained to operate the platform lift and will be available to assist those needing assistance.

The project continues to track within the overall budget of \$375K including funds sufficient to cover the tasks remaining to be done in the spring – the final painting of the elevator shaft's exterior and the restoration of the lawn on the south side of the church and the former Rocking Horse playground area. In summary we are pleased to report that the Accessibility Project has been successfully completed on time and within budget thanks in large part to the responsiveness and diligence of our general contractor.

# MIRACLE ON 25 SOUTH MAIN STREET—Dec. 9th!



"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat." - Matthew 25:35

Hunger affects every community. In The

United States, 1 in 7 individuals suffer from hunger. Nearly 400,000 households in Massachusetts do not know where their next meal is coming from. There are thousands of families struggling to keep food on their tables every day right here in our own back yard.

Pilgrim Church wants to help.

On December 9th Pilgrim Church will host our 4th annual Miracle at 25 South Main Street food-packing event that provides low cost, nutritious meals at just 25 cents per serving.

In 2015, End Hunger NE came to Pilgrim Church for the first time. It was a booming success! We originally hoped for 80 volunteers and 150 showed up. We challenged ourselves to make 25,000 meals and we ended up with funding for 38,827. 2016 and 2017 saw equal outpourings of support. Perhaps the greatest gift of those days was that people of all ages worked together to make it all happen.

Please join us to make 2018 equally as wonderful for our membership and the people we serve. Information and sign ups will be available in church. It's a wonderful day of goodwill, community and purposeful work for our neighbors in need.

Volunteers gather in teams of ten people. One station can pack 1,600 meals each hour. With your help, we will package and donate 30,000 meals on that day. This year we have decided to commit to 30,000 and will not be fundraising for additional meals on site.

Many thanks to all who have volunteered with this wonderful church-wide community opportunity. Special thanks to the Pilgrim Church Middle School and Senior High Youth Groups for their help with this event.

#### 2020 - AN UPDATE

Our 2020 committee has been conducting interviews and we have been able to speak with a majority of our fellow members to answer the question of what is the most important thing about Pilgrim Church to you. We have received valuable insights into those aspects of our congregational fabric that are so important we never want to change them.

We want to be sure that everyone understands the process as we move forward. Please understand that we have not "hired" a consultant because the church is in some kind of crisis. This is decidedly NOT the case. Our interviews have shown the level of satisfaction within our congregation to be very high. But we all know that our own population is aging and the involvement of young families is probably less than it once was.

Why then are we studying these issues? It is a fact that, in our modern society, faith communities of all sorts are having progressively smaller influence. On the other hand, there seems to be no lack of need for folks in general to connect to faith or a spiritual life. So, we are exploring the following questions:

- How do we put forth our faith for all the wonderfully positive things it includes to a modern society that is much different from what it was even 15 or 20 years ago and will only continue to change in unforeseen ways in the future?
- How do we extend the extravagant welcome of our congregation beyond the walls of the church in a way that is meaningful and promotes our Christian ideals?

So our actions are not due to any short-term concerns or perceived failings but, instead, because we recognize the need to explore ways to be more responsive to the demands of this crazy 21st century. The role of Barb, our consultant, is not to do an audit or outside evaluation of the church. We are doing that ourselves. Her role is to be an impartial observer and to provide spiritual guidance and to coordinate tasks within our strategic framework.

For those that don't know me, my name is Kristen Flynn. My husband, Kevin and I have been part of the Pilgrim community since we baptized our younger son Michael.

I have to be honest. When Steve called me with John's request to reflect on the theme of Values that Pilgrim brings to us, I had a little bit of a hard time narrowing down exactly what I want to say....because there is so much I could say about the Value of the experiences my family has had as part of the Pilgrim community.

I am a "learn by doing" kind of person. I think a lot of kids are like that too. We don't teach them how to tie their shoe by giving them a set or written directions, or how to read a book by telling them to look it up on YouTube. We don't teach them how to play a sport by giving them a workbook. Or give them an instrument and just say 'play'. We model that behavior. We encourage them to practice. We hold them in our laps and patiently work them through the steps of tying their shoe. We snuggle them at night with a favorite book which begins with us reading to them and progresses to them reading to us....And maybe we drift off first a time or two. We practice throwing the ball, holding the bat, playing Jingle Bells. Over and over and over. And then we celebrate their progress and success. We cheer for them because we have practiced with them.

Values are like this too. We can talk, and talk and talk about the Values we want our kids to have, trying to instill those values in them. But just like with tying their shoe, kids need to practice by doing in order for the instruction to stick. A few examples from my own experiences at Pilgrim come to mind:

My kids tease me, but I am moved to tears every year when the youth circle around the sanctuary to sing Silent Night by candlelight. God is present in the glow of the flame reflected back in the brightness of their smiles passed back and forth between each other. The peace and wonder they witness at that moment is indescribable.

I have held my mother's hand and listened in awe while Emily preached from her heart about the value of Peace. She connects in her own special way serving as youth Deacon.


I have witnessed my son MJ's delight in being able to connect and communicate with a Russian speaking neighbor about what fruits she would like in her Thanksgiving bag while serving in Brighton. And then I have held his hand in the silence of the car ride home as he comes to terms with just how abundant our table is.

I have laughed at the surprise on the faces of the MSYG kids when my son Michael uses slight of hand in a well practiced card trick. These MSYG kids that come together every year to continue Joan Whitman's tradition of hiding small red hearts with a big message. One of those hearts fell into my hand last Sunday when we opened the Hymnal - and it couldn't have happened at a more needed time.

Participating in the Angel Tree ministry, by selecting a child similar in age and then shopping for things as simple as a set of sheets, or a puzzle. A new set of sneakers. Really living the idea that making your Christmas list isn't about making a list of what you want but making a list of the ways you can give.

We can talk until we are blue in the face, but it's these experiences, these moments of faith in action, that instill the values like love and kindness that John spoke to last week, and that strengthen their faith and fill their hearts.

Kevin and I give to Pilgrim out of gratitude for having these opportunities to put our faith into action. Compassion. Contribution. Giving of yourself. To borrow a phrase - You are Loved. and I would add that You have love to give. That's what this community has brought to our efforts to instill values in our kids. We give what we can, when we can, because we will be forever grateful for this home and what is has given our family. I encourage you to reflect on the value Pilgrim has had on the sustenance of your own faith and values.

#### Prepare for the Christmas Tableau



Some years ago Pilgrim Church created a simple Children's Christmas Tableau that was full of meaning and low on stress – no lines to learn, no costumes to make, and only one rehearsal. The tradition continues with this year's tableau during the 10am worship service on Sunday, December 23.

Each church school class, PreK/K through Grade Five, is assigned a role and talks about its significance during class time: PreK/K are Stars; Grade One/Two are Animals or Angels; Grade Three/Four are Shepherds; Grade Five are Wise Persons; Grade Five with best attendance are Mary and Joseph; Grade Six students are Narrators and one of the youngest members of the congregation (whose parents have nerves of steel) is Baby Jesus.

It is a common misperception that domestic violence increases during the holidays. However, the holidays are certainly an opportunity to increase public awareness that domestic violence does not stop during the holidays and that the abuse and violence experienced by victims may be exacerbated by the financial stress and alcohol consumption that often accompany the holidays. Victims and survivors of domestic violence may experience additional stress and unique challenges over the holiday season and may turn to advocates at domestic violence organizations or to other resources in the community for needed support, such as safety planning specific to the holidays, food, gifts for their children, etc. Please see our spotlight organization below to which we provide support.

# Voices Against Violence

A service provided through SMOC, the mission of Voices Against Violence is to end sexual and domestic violence. Staff members work to empower victims and survivors to help themselves and their children. Program Advocates work in partnership with individuals and families to ensure their safety, create stable home environments, gain independence, and to develop personal and economic self -sufficiency. Voices is also a social change organization, working toward the elimination of violence on a societal level through community education, primary prevention and increased public awareness and action. Voices also works in close collaboration with public safety and criminal justice professionals throughout the region. Voices provides free and confidential services to victims and survivors of sexual and domestic violence in the MetroWest area. Services include a 24-hour hotline, crisis intervention, confidential short term emergency shelter, counseling and support groups, information and referrals, and medical, legal and criminal justice advocacy. **New Life Furniture Bank of MA** is a local mission based in Medfield, Massachusetts that collects lightly used furniture, cleans and/or refurnishes it and offers it free to families moving out of being homeless and getting into their new homes. They need Saturday morning work crews every weekend. Any able bodied person 14 years or older may join "the crew." First need is for workers 18 or older who can lift 50 lbs. or more. Those folks will go out with the company truck to pick up donations that are too big for donors to bring to the warehouse in Medfield. More workers are then needed to accept donations at the dock in the warehouse and move them to the showroom or the refurnishing area. Additional help is needed to aid newly housed families to load up furniture to furnish their new homes. Different tasks have different work schedules, but all work starts after 8:00 a.m. and ends by noon. Quick and easy, but such a huge help to a worthy mission.

Pilgrim Church has volunteered to staff a crew on Saturday morning, January 12<sup>th</sup>. 
