

From the Pastor...



And Jesus said..., "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.". --Luke 9:58

We all come from somewhere else. We are all on the way to somewhere else, too. In a way, "home" is always temporary. I've been thinking a lot about this human truth lately. What does it mean to be on a journey in this life?

A journey of faith, as we continually refine what we believe and how those beliefs shape our hopes for life as a child of God? A journey of aging, as relationships mature and change, life moves ahead, even ends. A journey: as we and others move from one place to

another, sometimes joyfully, sometimes reluctantly, saying hello, saying goodbye. A journey for some that's fraught with peril, danger even. Like a refugee fleeing war or poverty or an undocumented migrant crossing a border, seeking refuge and a new life, a new home, maybe risking it all.

Each Lent our church comes together to read a book: to talk about it, pray about it, think about, incorporate its themes into worship and invite that work to inform our Christian faith. In Lent 2018, our book is compelling, relevant and captures with raw intimacy one of the great questions facing our nation and community: that of immigration. Coming "here" from "somewhere else". Being on a journey. Leaving one home. Hoping for a new home.

"The Distance Between Us" is an inspirational memoir by award winning Mexican-American author Reyna Grande. Grande's story takes her from an impoverished childhood in Mexico, to living in the United States as a young undocumented immigrant, and finally, life as a U.S. citizen and best selling writer. The book captures the experience of crossing borders to seek a better life and the struggle to keep one family together in the midst of that journey. Our program will explore the intersection of immigration and faith.

How is our faith journey not just about arrival but also movement? What is life like for our neighbors who came here from somewhere else? We'll explore our own immigrant roots as pilgrims and people who trace ancestry to a distant place. We'll seek to be thoughtful, faithful and compassionate in our discussions, inviting all points of view, and asking Jesus' compelling question: "Who is my neighbor?"

The book is appropriate for 8th graders and up. Adopt it for your book group. Read it with a friend or your family. I'll be preaching about and leading classes after church and Wednesday mornings with a few more special events offered too. Look for a postcard mailing with all the details. The Bible is filled with stories of folks on the move, people and communities, traveling from one place to another, one home to another, from ancient Israel to Jesus, and later the itinerant disciples. They journeyed with God. Let's do the same this Lent.

One of my favorite passages of *The Christmas Carol* is when Dickens writes of the newly converted Scrooge, "...and it was always said of him, that he knew how to keep Christmas well, if any man alive possessed the knowledge."

I like the idea of "keeping Christmas."

There is a famous passage on the subject written by Henry Van Dyke. Here is part of it.

"Are you willing to forget what you have done for other people, and to remember what other people have done for you.....to ignore what the world owes you, and to think what you owe the world; to own that probably the only good reason for your existence is not what you are going to get out of life, but what you are going to give to life....to close your book of complaints against the management of the universe, and look around you for a place where you can sow a few seeds of happiness... to stop asking how much your friends love you, and ask yourself whether you love them enough... to try to understand what those who live in the same house with you really want, without waiting for them to tell you.... Are you willing to believe that love is the strongest thing in the world--stronger than hate, stronger than evil, stronger than death--and that the blessed life which began in Bethlehem nineteen hundred years ago is the image and brightness of the Eternal Love? Then you can keep Christmas. And if you keep it for a day, why not always? But you can never keep it alone."

Here's to every one of us keeping Christmas, exactly in the manner described above, not just today, nor just through the winter, but the whole year long.

DEACONS' CORNER...

Signing Off

When I tell people from outside our church that I am a Deacon at Pilgrim, many times they ask me "what does a Deacon do?" I've never really had a smooth answer for them. I usually let them know what we do—prepare the sanctuary for worship, greet people as they arrive and hand out the bulletins, run the elevator, ring the bell, record the service, take the collection, say a prayer, and clean up the sanctuary after the service. But just describing what we do does not capture the spirit of being a Deacon.

During my time as a Deacon, I have felt more a part of Pilgrim than ever before — even though I had been an active member of Pilgrim Church for over 20 years at that point. The best way that I can describe it to those in our community is that in a small way the Deacons try to follow the example of Jesus to lead by serving. We are helping care for the flock. To welcome the newcomer, to assist those who need help, to quietly make sure that the service goes smoothly (those who attend regularly know that we don't always succeed — but we are trying!)

Another Deacon responsibility is to serve at funerals that are held at Pilgrim Church. When we serve at funerals, we are serving people during their time of need. And at those times we are the face of Pilgrim Church to the many people coming through our doors for the first time. For me, the opportunity to serve at funerals is a humbling and moving experience, and allows us to show people the support and caring of the Pilgrim community.

I have been so fortunate to serve as a Deacon for the past six years. But as of the Congregational meeting, the first Sunday of February, my second three year term is up and I will be rolling off of the Deacons (for at least a year). The reason for this is that when Pastor John came to Pilgrim he recommended that term limits be put in place for the Deacons. I think that change has contributed to making the Deacons stronger, as there are constantly new Deacons, and with them new ideas, rolling in. If it were not for term limits, I may never have had the opportunity to serve as a Deacon.

So now there will be a few new Deacons starting their terms this month. Give them a warm welcome when you see them!

2018 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN REFLECTS TREMENDOUS GENEROSITY


With the 2018 Stewardship Campaign officially concluded, the Stewardship Committee wishes to express its deepest gratitude to all who contributed to the success of this year's Campaign. Supported by the generosity of 153 pledges totaling \$503,874 and one-time gifts of \$8,750 the Parish Board was able to recommend a balanced budget for the coming year.

By the numbers, the pledges and one-time gifts for the Operating Budget totaled \$478,768, \$29,289 for Missions, and \$4,467 to be added to the church endowment. There were ten new pledges adding \$11,260, ninety-one pledges with increases totaling \$26,017, and 39 pledges remained unchanged. Ten pledges were decreased from the previous year. The net increase in pledges for the Stewardship Campaign for 2018 was \$28,439.

As paraphrased in our *Welcoming Statement* – *An Open Table*, "every member and friend of this congregation is invited to participate fully in all the sacraments, rites, privileges and responsibilities of our shared life at Pilgrim Church." Our deepest thanks to everyone who makes possible the vibrant life of Pilgrim Church we so highly value. Together we build and support Pilgrim Church as shown on the final chart as of the date of this report, January 22, 2018.



"NEW SALVATION ARMY DINNER"--A WORK IN PROGRESS"!!

The NEW Salvation Army Dinner program officially kicked off on January 8. It is still very much a "work in progress".

The new program is a combination of the old Salvation Army "Miracle Kitchen" & United Way Café programs. Hot dinners will now be served Monday through Friday from 5:00-7:00 PM at the "Pearl Street Café at Park" located at 46 Park Street in Framingham. The café has tables of ten (10) & can seat 120 people at a time.

Under the new "combined" program, all meals will now be prepared on site daily by a full time chef. Rather than preparing the food for meals as was done in the past, volunteer organizations like Pilgrim Church will now be asked to provide the manpower to serve the dinners "restaurant style" to guests. MANY THANKS to the twenty-one (21) volunteers from the Pilgrim Church congregation and MSYG members & supervisors who participated in our first dinner at the new location last Wednesday (1/24)!

In addition to providing manpower to serve dinner once per quarter, Pilgrim Church volunteers are also encouraged to provide needed, non-perishable pantry items. A list of most "needed" items is available at the Pilgrim Church office. Items may be dropped off anytime in Framingham at the Salvation Army, 59 Howard Street or the Pearl Street Café at Park, 46 Park Street. In addition, once a quarter, pantry items will be delivered from church on the night we are serving dinner (our next dinner date is 4/25/18).
