--Mark 16:2

If you've ever been awake at the time of very early morning just before dawn...

Just before the sun comes up...

Just before the day begins and the house wakes up and the world starts anew...

Just before the birds begin to sing and life seems to begin again....

Maybe you woke up because you could not sleep because something was worrying you and so you are up. Maybe you woke up because the baby needed to be fed or the dog scratched at the bedroom door or the drip, drip, drip of the kitchen faucet was so loud. Maybe you woke up because your to-do list crashed into your slumber.

You are awake. That time can feel lonely. As if you are the only person in all the world. Even as if hope is kind of hard to find in this weird in between time, in between night and day, evening and morning, sleep and awakening.

Now imagine you are awake but it is 2,000 years ago and it is two days since your best friend and teacher, Jesus, was taken, put on trial by the state and religious authorities for speaking of love and radical welcome for all and God's care for each and every person on the earth. And so now you and some friends, just before dawn, just as pale pink light dances on the horizon, are going to the place where he is buried. To mourn. To pray. To carry out sacred rituals.

But even as you walk to that place you still have a glimmer of hope, because Jesus said he would come back, he would live again. He would return, that even death could not stop him or his message or God's love.

And so you hope. You see the light even before it shows up. You believe in him, even before you see him. You trust that God will come through, even though right now that is not so clear or evident.

You hope.

At Easter, as Christians, we hope. We awaken before dawn and trust in the sunrise and the Son Rise. We see a dark world sometimes filled with violence and despair and yet we also envision a world filled with peace and joy. We have courage and keep on walking because we are not alone, we have each other and the one who never dies, walks right there with us too. Even, especially just before the sun comes up.

Imagine that. Come. The Son is coming soon. Holy Week. Easter. The journey beckons. From twilight to sunlight. From fear to hope. From shadows to sunshine. I'm ready for that trip. I pray you are too.

Moderator's Message

I do not imagine my family is so very different from most others. We have five immediate members. My wife's and my parents are all alive, we both have full time jobs, a blessed assortment of friends and neighbors, and feel lucky for all that we have.

And yet, in just the past twelve weeks we have had two major surgeries in the family; one emergency and one scheduled. We have had an out-of-state condo to vacate and prep for sale, we've had a family member deal with alcohol rehabilitation. There have been sicknesses, job scares and their associated worries. We've had dear friends share the devastating news of the reoccurrence of a terrible cancer. The daily news in the world has been overwhelming and hard to process. And while there have been plenty of happy moments during this time too, which we cherish, if one were to add up all the negatives, they could leave a person reeling. And as I said earlier, I know we are no different from most other families these days in that all of our 'emotional plates' are pretty full.

And so I say that this is a very good time to be a Christian person of faith.

The most important part of leading a life of faith is understanding that, given all that we have to deal with, we do not have to deal with it alone. God is there for us every single moment of every day. With God, I know that I do not have to be perfect or have all the answers; I do not have to be the toughest, strongest, smartest guy in the room. When the worries I carry get past my ability to hold them, I turn them over to God and ask for help. And when I do ask, I have deep abiding trust that while I cannot control the timing of the response, it will surely come - in ways that are most often unexpected. It is only over the course of time that circumstances which in the moment can seem so dire - almost always lead to positive, unanticipated outcomes.

Is there a price we must pay for this Christian life? Yes, I believe there is. Our first job is to never give up on God. Easy to say, and sometimes, in the moment, quite hard to do. After that, we must lead lives focused on others, in a manner that is deserving of God's grace. We should live joyfully, dedicated to making things better and focusing on the positive. We should be optimistic, hopeful and remember that tomorrow will be kinder.

But what if we are not feeling that way? What if we cannot simply do that....? That's fine too. It is alright. A little failure now and then is accounted for and is an integral part of the system. Just ask God for strength and forgiveness and it shall be granted. Then start over. And try again.

Accessibility Project Update

As presented and voted at the Special Congregational Meeting on October 15, 2017 this project encompasses a new self-operated commercial elevator, a platform lift for access to the back hall from the sanctuary and improved drainage on the south side of the building including the elevator area. Thanks to generous responses from Church families this capital project is fully funded with a budget of \$375,000.

We are pleased to report that the design phase of our project remains on the original schedule and within budget. As we reported at our Church's recent annual meeting we are delighted to have received all five of the waivers that we had requested from the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board. As a result the granite ramp at the front entrance to the Church does not have to be modified nor does the access leading past the choir loft to the back hall have to be widened to meet current ADA Code. During February our architect completed a preliminary drawing package for construction bidding which we have now reviewed and requested small changes. Our only surprise on the project to date is that the Sherborn Historic District Committee (HDC) has challenged our initial design for the elevator housing and associated machine room. They see the footprint for the combined structure as being too large an appendage to our historic building. We are exploring design options and plan to meet with the HDC in March to seek their approval.

To keep the project on schedule our architect plans to complete the drawing package for construction bidding by early March. We, along with our architect, plan to meet with four preselected General Contractors (GC) prior to submission of their bids, which we hope to receive in April. Our goal remains to have the construction phase awarded before June 1st. As mentioned at the annual meeting we have been alerted that the construction phase will be at least 6 months with elevator access to the Sanctuary unavailable during that entire period. As a result we will be looking for a GC that has experience in delivering a quality product in the shortest amount of time.

DEACONS' CORNER...

Of my many favorite parts of the Easter celebration at Pilgrim Church, my very favorite is the deacon's tradition of decorating the sanctuary with flowers. While many symbols of Easter that represent fertility, new life, and rebirth have been secularized (think Easter eggs and Easter bunnies), flowers still have a religious connotation.

All tulips symbolize passion, belief and love, but white and purple tulips have special meaning. White tulips represent forgiveness while purple tulips represent royalty, both important aspects of the Christian Easter celebration. Hyacinth flowers represent peace of mind.

But perhaps no flower is more associated with Easter than the lily. The bulb of these flowers buried in the ground represents the tomb of Jesus and the glorious white trumpet-like fragrant flowers symbolize His life after death. The snowy white color stands for the purity of the Divine Savior and the joy of the resurrection while the trumpet shape signifies Gabriel's trumpet call to rebirth and new life. In his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus alludes to the beauty of the flowers, reminding his listeners that King Solomon, with all of his riches, was not dressed as beautifully as the lilies of the field.

There are a number of legends to explain the origin of the Easter lily.

- Eve's Tears: According to legend, the first lilies appeared when Eve shed tears of repentance upon being cast out of the Garden of Eden.
- The Sweat of Christ: Other legends claim that lilies sprang forth when Christ shed drops of sweat upon the earth during the crucifixion,
- Mary's Tomb: Another legend proclaims that when visitors returned to Mary's tomb after her death all that was found was a bed of lilies as Mary had been taken directly to heaven.

Whatever your favorite, whatever your meaning, the deacons hope you enjoy Pilgrim's tradition of flowers.
