Accessibility Project Update


This is the third in a series of monthly reports on the status of the capital project that encompasses a commercial elevator for the sanctuary, an inclined platform lift from the sanctuary to the education wing and improved drainage for the south side of the sanctuary.

We are pleased to report that the Church has received a General Contractor bid from R P Valois & Co. of Dartmouth, MA that is very close to our project budget of \$310K for that portion of the project! Their bid is allencompassing and compliant with our architect's drawings with no significant exceptions listed. As we reported to the Congregation in mid-April, we learned during the bidding process that commercial elevators commonly use 3 phase power as opposed to the single phase power presently in the Church. The Valois proposal solves this issue by including a single to 3 phase power converter dedicated to the elevator.

Because the only other bid we received was well above the competitive range, we anticipate signing the General Contract with Valois in early May. The schedule proposed by Valois shows them starting in May with site work beginning in early June. Their schedule also shows the entire project being completed by November (assuming no surprises of course).

DEACONS' CORNER...

A Brief History of the life of Dr. Reverend Edmund Dowse

I have walked past Rev. Edmund Dowse's portrait and Senate chair in the sanctuary entryway for years and often wondered about this former pastor. I've learned that he served our church as pastor for 67 years, at that point the longest-serving minister in our country, and was elected as Senator and then Chaplain in the Massachusetts State Senate. The chair beneath his portrait was his actual chair from the Senate chamber. Rev. Dowse was a very distinguished and well-regarded man, and one whose legacy touches our lives in Sherborn to this day. Let me tell you a few facts about him:

Edmund Dowse was born September 17, 1813 to Benjamin and Thankful Dowse on the family farm in East Sherborn. Several Dowse families had settled in Sherborn after their homestead in Charlestown was burned to the ground in 1775.

Edmund attended school in Sherborn until 1830 when he was admitted to Day's Academy in Wrentham, where for two years he attended a college preparatory course administered by the congregational church.

Edmund joined the Sherborn Evangelical Society --now Pilgrim Church—along with 65 other men and women in 1830 when it split off from Sherborn's established state church during the Unitarian vs. Trinitarian controversy of the day. His father was one of the original 12 men that signed the warrant sent to a Town of Natick Justice. The warrant requested incorporation of Sherborn's second congregational church, separating it from the more liberal and unitarian First Parish. After the split, both congregations built new church buildings which stand to this day. In 1830 the land for our church cost \$200 and the building cost \$3,000, amounts raised by our 66 original members.

After his college preparatory classes, Edmund attended Amherst College and graduated in 1836. Next, he studied theology with Dr. Jacob Ide of Medway until he was ordained as Pastor of the Sherborn Evangelical Society in 1838. He was married to Elizabeth Leland a few days before being ordained, and soon bought a house at 25 Farm Road in which he lived for the rest of his life.

Edmund Dowse became one of the most famous preachers in the area, renowned for his sermons and wedding ceremonies, with couples coming from out of state to be married by him. On the occasion of Edmund Dowse's 25th anniversary at Sherborn Evangelical Society on October 10, 1863, a day-long celebration was held at the church including twenty-six ministers in attendance. Rev. William M. Thayer of Franklin, a graduate of Brown University and prolific author, read the following original poem honoring Rev. Dowse:

Time like a silent stream hath sped Down through this "vale of tears," And on its surging tide hath fled These five and twenty years.

How bright our new-born hopes have been, How sweet their memory still; How vast the swelling joys within Each faithful soul to fill!

> Alas, for tears and broken ties, With which our God alloys, Alas, for sorrows and for sighs, All mingled with our joys.

So clouds obscure the rising sun; So flowerets fade away; So stars their transient courses run; So night succeeds the day.

Great God! we own thy love and care In all our hopes and fears; Thy goodness hallows by our prayers These five and twenty years.

Soon after the celebration, Rev. Dowse served in the Civil War as chairman of the Christian Commission with the Army of the Cumberland and served as Chaplain in Nashville Tennessee in 1864, during which his second wife died of pneumonia in Sherborn.

In 1870, as chairman of the Massachusetts Senate Committee on Prisons, Rev. Dowse presented a prison reformation bill to provide separate prisons for women, which passed and became law, providing the first women's prison in the country. A location was chosen within the northern border of Sherborn near the railroad center of South Framingham, with buildings ready for occupancy in 1877. You can see these original buildings today as you drive from Western Avenue just past the Framingham border.

Rev. Dowse served on the first Sherborn School Committee and continued as chairman for 65 years, and also served as Chairman of the Board of Sawin Academy, one of the predecessors to today's Dover-Sherborn High School. He was instrumental in bringing the railroad through Sherborn. Although we may not much appreciate this fact today, in the mid-1800s a railroad was critical to the town's economy and allowed it to prosper. Sherborn had some of largest cider mills in the country and shipped its famous cider as far as England.

The Sherborn Evangelical Society had no heat in the building for the first 18 years! Can you imagine what it was like to preach to the "chosen frozen"? Under Rev. Dowse's leadership, the church had a furnace installed in 1848 and in 1853 the church building was moved back from the road and raised up 10 feet to provide space for Fellowship Hall. In 1875 upon a vote of the congregation, Pilgrim Church was almost named "The Gookin Evangelical Society" to honor the first pastor of the church from 1685. Thankfully, the congregation rescinded this vote and renamed it "The Pilgrim Society" before the petition was sent to and accepted by the state legislature!

In 1886 Amherst College awarded Rev. Dowse an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree.

Services were held to celebrate and honor his 25 years, 40, 50 and finally on the occasion of his sixtieth year as Pastor in 1898 a commemoration was held with over 600 distinguished visitors arriving by train to Sherborn. As was noted in the national press, on the occasion of his ninetieth birthday, Dr. Dowse was commemorated as the oldest Congregational minister in active service in the United States.

Edmund's life was visited by tragedy several times: his first wife Elizabeth Leland died in childbirth in 1842, and his second wife Elizabeth Bowditch died in 1864 while he was serving in the Civil War. His third wife Caroline Davis outlived him.

Dr. Edmund Dowse died on April 27, 1905; of his five children, only a son and a daughter survived him. He died as the last remaining member of his class and oldest graduate of Amherst College.

The next time you are walking by his portrait and chair in the back of the sanctuary, take a look at the many artifacts and programs commemorating the life of a man who changed the intellectual, spiritual, and physical landscape of early Sherborn!

END OF THE SCHOOL YEAR MILESTONES


Hard to believe but the end of our church school year is almost here. Put these events on your calendar now so your family won't miss these annual milestone events....


