Moderator's Message

I visited my parents in Colorado this past August, somewhat reluctantly, because I was not convinced I had the time to spare. It turned out to be an amazing week though, and one I will cherish for a long time.

It turns out my travelling companion, James Meyer, came down with some kind of a bug, and it really knocked him low for more than half our trip. A lot of our plans to travel, whitewater raft, and fish had to be cancelled or greatly reduced. Happily, those curtailed plans presented other wonderful opportunities I had not foreseen.

I took a solo hike up to the top of Nine Mile Mountain; its peak is about 10,000 ft above sea level, and I had to stop frequently as I climbed to catch my breath. I sat alone at the top for about an hour and had a chance to share my lunch with a very friendly (and hungry) bird. On my way back, I passed a scenic overview that looked down across the lovely valley. Within the overlook area was a mail box - labeled "God's mailbox" - stocked with paper, pens, and a mail slot with which to write God a letter. I happily took advantage of that special opportunity to do so.

Later in the week, my mother asked me if I wanted to go see the aftermath of a fire that burned in their area about 6 weeks prior to our arrival. It was, luckily, a small fire (comparatively for Colorado, anyway) that had been successfully extinguished in two or three days. The landscape was barren; a blackened, charred ruin of complete destruction. Or so I thought. My mother pointed out a little flower. She told me it was called Fireweed. It is the first colonizer in the soil after forest fires. (Its Latin name is Chamerion angustifolium, if you care to look it up online.) It's an absolutely beautiful little pink flower, and there were a lot of them. Its presence greatly moved me. It seemed to say that, even in the middle of this vast blackness, God wants us know we are to remain hopeful, healing and renewed life are on their way, and better days surely lie ahead for us.

The balance of the week was spent working on the land and in the woods that surround my parents' house, cutting fallen trees and splitting logs that became the firewood they will burn through the long, upcoming winter. When the work was complete, we sat on the deck, conversed about issues large and small, and soaked in their spectacular view of the continental divide.

This turned out to be a most unexpected chance to experience and appreciate God, so displayed in His magnificent earthly creation. That I was able to do that, while sharing a special week with my son and parents, was a gift for which I shall always remain grateful.

Pilgrim Church Helps in Youth Led Drive

Last spring Pilgrim Church's own Dagny Abbett, a sixth My Brother's Keeper grader, led an effort to secure basic items for folks served through "My Brother's Keeper", a Massachusetts based A Christian ministry of loving service and education Christian organization of volunteers that delivers furniture,

household items and food, free of charge, to those who seek assistance. Dagny writes, "Dear Pastor John: Thank you so much for letting me do a drive through the church. It was super successful. I raised over 130 supplies! I also bought a lot of supplies. I bought 20 cake mixes, 20 frostings, 20 cans of oil (to make birthday bags), 20 bags, 20 salt and pepper shakers, 20 toothbrushes, 20 toothpastes, 20 containers of baby wipes, and 20 deodorants. I delivered the supplies to My Brother's Keeper and did some food deliveries in the afternoon. We did about 7 deliveries, they were mostly to older [people] who didn't get out much and fairly young people on their first apartment."

ACCESSIBILITY PROJECT UPDATE

This is the sixth in a series of reports on the status of the capital project that encompasses a commercial elevator for the sanctuary, an inclined platform lift from the sanctuary to the education wing and improved drainage for the south side of the sanctuary.

The General Contract is continuing to progress smoothly. This past month the roof shingles, exterior siding and trim for the elevator and control room were installed. Installation began on the three phase power conversion system as did installation of the heat pump for the elevator control room climate control. The General Contractor (GC) RP Valois Inc. is now ready for the elevator hydraulics & cab when they arrive from the Otis Inc. manufacturing plant in South Carolina - hopefully by early October. The GC has also completed all the wiring and wall reinforcement for the platform lift, which is expected to arrive from the manufacturer Garaventa Inc. by mid-October.

The major remaining activities in the construction schedule are 1) Installation of the elevator hydraulics & cab and 2) Installation of the inclined platform lift. These tasks may stretch into November because of late deliveries from the manufacturers. There is still an outside chance we will have use of the elevator by the end of November. Regarding actual cost of the project, in September the GC invoiced another \$111K which included his costs as well as the remaining manufacturing costs for the elevator and platform lift subcontracts with only the on-site installation portion of those subcontracts remaining. To date the money expended totals \$226K out of our overall budget of \$375K, so at present we continue to track comfortably within the project budget.

PILGRIM CHURCH 2020 UPDATE

"If you want to make the world a better place, take a look at yourself, and then make a change."

I'm not very good at change. Little changes – a new shirt, socks first *then* pants, different yogurt flavor – those are fine enough. It's the big changes that are really challenging. The 'boy, things are not going to be the same again after this' and 'the old way just doesn't work

anymore' kind of changes that can be scary, unsettling and stressful.

Every now and then though, they do come with a tinge of excitement – especially when those changes bring the promise of something new. An adventure. An opportunity to see what it's like to do something you've wondered about or felt drawn to but have been too settled, too stuck, or too unsure to explore.

I am a part of the Pilgrim 2020 Committee; a group of about thirteen members of our Pilgrim community that has been asked to start thinking about how we as a church could better serve each other, the broader community, and the wider world. Our reality is that as the society around us changes, doing church "the way we always used to" is getting less and less effective. This isn't a judgment, it's simply true. To be relevant to this changing world means that we'll need to find new ways to reach out, attract, and nurture newcomers. To be honest, this is also true of the people who are currently at Pilgrim Church; our real lives and real needs often require the church to serve and respond to us in new ways.

Our first step on this path has been hiring Pastor Barbara Lemmel to help guide the 2020 Committee and our church community as a whole in thinking about, talking about, and bringing to practice Jesus' message of love, service, and grace to each other and our communities. The first step in considering how we may need or want to change is to gain a clear understanding about what is most important at Pilgrim Church – what is so core to our identity that it should not change. The Pilgrim 2020 Committee will be holding two after-church listening sessions with the congregation to hear what you feel is most important about Pilgrim Church. It is the Committee's goal to talk to as many of you as we can, and we'll put these answers together to create guiding principles for the church's future.

Stay tuned to hear more about the 2020 effort over the next few weeks, but in the meantime, we'd like you to start to ponder this question:

What, for you, is the most important thing about church?

DEACONS' CORNER...

Elmore: Tuesday after Labor Day, classes started, and I wasn't there for the first time in 60 years. I retired from the university on June 30; and every September since first grade marked the start of a new school year as a student, a teacher, or an administrator. The day struck me as odd and unusual but not as uncomfortable. As I watched the start of the church year the next Sunday. I had to stop and think about how much different it must feel to the church youth who, while not starting their first school years, is clearly at the other end of the continuum.

Daniel: Tuesday after Labor Day, classes started, and I was there for the first time in 76 days (not that I'm counting). This is my 12th year starting over as a student. It was not an odd feeling since this is all I remember happening after Labor day. But you know what, the first week was not what I had been expecting. Things were different this year. Many changes took place in my life, including my activities and friends. It made me stop and think, things will not be the same this year. But from what I hear from my adult friends at Pilgrim, this happens in life.

Elmore: If you look to the back of the church when you come in or during the service, you'll see Deacons' hustle and bustle that always combines "senior" Deacons and "youth" Deacons. That we include high school church members in the Deacons is something that I find particularly rewarding. I've taught both Senior High Sunday School and Confirmation Class in the last 30 years but working alongside high school students is a very different experience. The shared responsibility and more equal status of working together makes for very different interactions. In the last several years, I've gotten to know several student Deacons. As you might suspect they are an impressive group. When I hear adults grimace about the young generation, I know that their interaction with this generation is superficial. Adults (like our youth group leaders) who get the opportunity to work closely with the youth in our congregation build much deeper relationships. I have the same kind of excitement when I participate in the Miracle on South Main Street. When I grew up in the church many years ago I had several opportunities to participate in working relationships with adults at my church. They were some of my most important experiences. Unfortunately, there are not many opportunities for youth and adults to work together in such a fashion. I'm certainly glad that this is an emphasis of our church.

Daniel: If you looked in the back of the church when you came into Pilgrim Church on the first Sunday of the year, I was there (my Dad scheduled me on the first Sunday!). Even though I would have preferred sleeping as late as possible that first Sunday of the year it was nice to be back. After a difficult first week of school, it was nice to be back filling water glasses and loading hymn numbers. But what really made the difference was adults who said "hey Daniel, how was your summer and how was the first week". They are genuinely interested in the answer. That's the difference at Pilgrim Church. Adults who really care about your answer and what you say.

Elmore: I'm going to miss my interactions with students now that I have retired from the university. I look forward, however, continuing to make those connections through church. Stop by at the end of church some Sunday and introduce yourself to one of the youth Deacons. There's an opportunity to be impacted or to have impact waiting to happen.

Daniel: I get plenty of interactions with students. (Ok, not plenty because this is the life I lead), However, I look forward each Sunday to continuing my adult connections through church. Most adults in my life are concerned with my grades, my attention span, how much I use my phone, did I do my chores, or my ability to win on the field. At Pilgrim Church, it's different. Adults here just want to get to know me. So students (ok, how many are really reading this), stop by church any given Sunday and just say hi to the first adult you see and you will be surprised. I know I have been impacted.



On Becoming an Open and Affirming Church A Process of Discernment

In our recently adopted welcoming statement, "An Open Table", our congregation has enthusiastically confirmed our desire to be open to all people of faith.

We are exploring the opportunity to expand this welcome by becoming an Open and Affirming (ONA) church. To become ONA affirms a covenant with people of all sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions to participate in the full life and ministry of our congregation, including membership, leadership, and employment. Through this covenant our congregation would promise to live out this welcome in meaningful ways in response to Christ's teaching of radical hospitality, accept one another, just as Christ has accepted you, in order to bring praise to God." (Romans 15:7)

With the approval of Pastor John and Parish Board, a discernment group has been formed to begin the process of determining whether Pilgrim church wishes to join 1200 other UCC churches in becoming a designated ONA church. We expect this discernment process to be an extended time of dialogue, study, and prayer; of active listening and respectful interaction as committed members of a vibrant faith community. We will conduct the process for whatever time it takes as we hear from all members of our congregation while we contemplate this step forward.

We want to hear from you! We will begin this process with individual or small group discussions and communications. We want to hear your concerns, your supportive feedback, or any other communication that you feel is relevant to this discernment. Our group is committed to approaching these conversations with an open spirit of appreciative listening. Our group is composed of the following members:





In 2002, Dr. Jeff Dalin had the idea to provide kids in need with dental care. He organized the first *Give Kids A Smile* event in a run-down soon-to-bedemolished dental clinic in St. Louis, providing free dental care to nearly 400 children. In 2003, the American Dental Association adopted the program and launched the Give Kids A Smile program nationally. Since then it has provided more than five million underserved children free oral health services over the last 13 years. These free services are provided by approximately 10,000 dentists annually, along with 30,000 other dental team members.
