From the Pastor...

Every summer I have coffee with some of Pilgrim Church's graduated high school seniors before they leave for college. That departure for them is one of those rare life moments when

one can say things are going to be very different in a big way; life is about to change like never before. Always I find that these young people are excited and anxious, worried and happy, ready to go and already a bit sad about leaving home. Their's is a life crossroad like no other. But go they must!

We talk about lots of things in our time together: what classes they will take and if they've picked a major. How it feels to be going away and what it will mean for them to be fully in charge of their day to day lives. I always ask them how they think they will handle the college social scene with all its opportunities and all its temptations. I encourage them to explore opportunities for faith and service communities too, so that what they've learned at church about God and doing good in this world might continue to shape their young lives. And I always try to offer them one final piece of advice.

"Remember what matters the most to you; who you are, your core beliefs and values, what makes you, 'you', who God made you to be. Hang on to that. Have integrity in knowing that you are created by God for a purpose in this life and then work for it." I say this because for them, for all of us as humans, there is a power in standing upon a foundation of values for our lives. Knowing what we cherish the most: in how we want to love, how we want to behave, how we hope to interact with others, in the quality of the life we live each day.

For us as Christians the eternal and faithful values we look to are grounded in the life of Jesus: how he lived. Who he loved. What he would say is a truly good life in the deepest sense. Every September I get excited about returning, in a way, to the gift and the discipline of life in our faith community. Of remembering each week just who calls us together and just why we choose to make faith an integral part of our lives. I like to think it is, in part, because we want to live in an intentional way, a spiritual way. To declare that certain God-given values matter most to us and that we are going to try our best to live them out. To support each other in those efforts. To remind ourselves we can live with Godly integrity, even in a world filled with so many temptations and so many competing values.

What are the Christian values that matter the most to you? What are the values you wish to give to your children? Think on these things. And see you very soon!

DEACONS' CORNER...

Sitting in the sanctuary listening to the prelude one Sunday morning, I found myself wondering about the church organ, which is visibly represented by the decorative facade pipes above the pulpit and choir loft. How old is it? Is there a back story associated with it? How could I find the answers to these questions?

The answers came from a paper researched and written in 1990 by David Tiedman, the Pilgrim Church organist for 33 years. David provided me with additional information and gave me a tour of the organ chamber.

The Pilgrim Church organ was made in Boston by the E. & G. G. Hook Company and installed in 1864. It is Opus 338, or the 338th organ made by that company and it was custom built for the sanctuary. In 1864 the Civil War was well underway so the decision to embark on such a large purchase gives one some idea of the difference in attitude and priorities between the North and South. Although there is no record of the amount paid for the instrument (it may have been a gift), it was insured on April 1, 1864 at a value of \$1000 by the Springfield Fire and Marine Company. The cost of the policy was \$36 for five years.

While the facade pipes are visible, a chamber behind the organ holds 1,056 more pipes on several levels as well as the bellows mechanism which operates the instrument. When it was installed, there was no electricity so the bellows were worked by hand by someone in the chamber and repairs were made utilizing oil lamps. Electricity to the organ arrived in 1921.

The picture (below left) shows the sanctuary and facade pipes c. 1880. You can notice that the organ console is visible, that there is a central pulpit and a different pew arrangement than what we now have. Over the years the pipes have been redecorated several times, once with a plain background and bands of a contrasting color and once with just a solid brown/gold color. The current design was done in 1991 and looks similar to the 1880 picture.

In 1945 the First Parish Church (today's Unitarian Church) and Pilgrim Church agreed to merge after having been separate for over one hundred years. The new association was called the Federated Church of Sherborn. Although services were initially held in both buildings, it was decided that Pilgrim Church would be used as the Parish House and community center. Major redecoration was undertaken at Pilgrim Church, which included lowering the floor around the organ to resemble a stage and separating the organ by "carefully" sawing off the console and storing it and the bench in the organ chamber. Although this seems a drastic measure, it, in fact, probably contributed to a lesser amount of damage as the instrument was out of the way and undisturbed.

In 1963 the Federated Church of Sherborn was dissolved. The organ console and bench were reattached to the pipes in about 1964, a century after having been originally installed. It continues in use today with a few modifications. It is believed that the sound is very much as it was in 1864 although the acoustics in the sanctuary have changed somewhat with the installation of the carpet.

The Pilgrim Church Hook organ is now 154 years old. David estimates that it would cost around \$300,000 to replace the instrument today. It represents nineteenth century craftsmanship that has stood the test of time and continues to provide a magnificent addition to worship at Pilgrim Church.

ACCESSIBILITY PROJECT UPDATE

This is the fifth in a series of reports on the status of the capital project that encompasses a commercial elevator for the sanctuary, an inclined platform lift from the sanctuary to the education wing and improved drainage for the south side of the sanctuary.

Significant progress has been achieved on the project since our last newsletter report in early June. Over the course of the summer the masonry elevator shaft and the housing for the control room have been constructed along with the implementation of the new drainage system on the south side of Fellowship Hall. In addition the carpentry and electrical work to allow installation of the new platform lift leading to the education wing have been completed.

The planned June 1st start of the project was delayed by several weeks in early June while we obtained final approval from the Sherborn Building Commissioner. Once excavation started we uncovered some huge boulders leading to more delay. These two issues caused us to fall one month behind our original project schedule, so the target completion date is now prior to Thanksgiving. Major remaining activities in construction schedule are as follows:



- Completion of the elevator & control room exterior September
- Install elevator hydraulics & cab September/October
- Install platform lift to education wing October
- Final inspection & completion November

Regarding actual cost of the project, we have incurred a total of \$22,000 in change orders to date, the most notable being as follows:

Upgrade to a three phase power converter acceptable to Otis - \$13,000

Additional excavation work - \$5,000

The change order total is just over one half of our budget allocated for contingencies, so we still expect to remain within the overall project budget of \$375,000

Forest Bathing Event:



Come home on Welcoming Sunday

Come home to your church school and youth fellowship family on Welcoming Sunday, September 9, the first Sunday after Labor Day. Church school students will begin worship in the sanctuary at 10am and then come down to Fellowship Hall after *Children's Time* to gather with classmates and teachers before heading off to the classrooms. But we do ask that you prayerfully consider nurturing the habit of regular worship with your Pilgrim faith family. The Christian Education committee salutes faithful attendance each year because our church community recognizes the value of spiritual discipline. And don't forget that the roles of Mary and Joseph go to those fifth graders with the best attendance from September through Advent! Also, please let us know if custodial arrangements will affect your child's church school attendance so that we might factor that in the mix when making end-of-the-year awards.



News for Eighth Grade Families

Our Whole Lives

This fall Pilgrim Church and Dover Church will again be joint sponsors of a human sexuality course designed for eighth grade students. This course adapts the UCC curriculum, Our Whole Lives, and explores information, values, and the communication skills necessary to make responsible and healthy decisions about one's sexuality in the context of faith. As outlined in the June letter we sent to all 8th grade families, we can only accept twelve Pilgrim Church students this year. Confirmation

At weekly supper meetings eighth graders in the Pilgrim Church family will review the essential elements of our faith and explore what it means to be a Christian through reading assignments, writing exercises and group discussion led by staff and volunteers. Seasoned with games, music and fun with friends, the central purpose of the classes is preparing students to make an informed choice to become full members of Pilgrim Church, United Church of Christ, by confirming their commitment to the promises of baptism. Each confirmation class usually has a few students, not previously baptized, who are baptized during class time in a meaningful, low-key atmosphere.

An important feature of confirmation is the opportunity to develop a mentoring relationship with an adult member of our congregation. Confirmands and mentors share four activities of their choice related to living a Christian life past experiences have included attending a Holy Week worship service, baking bread for communion, and attending a gospel concert. Mentors attend the last class of each month with their confirmands to share their faith stories and reflect on shared activities. Additionally mentors will help with one class during the four months of confirmation. Mentors and confirmands also go on an overnight retreat with church leaders. Some students have a clear idea whom they would like to ask to be a mentor; others seek suggestions from staff. In either case, just remember that mentors must be members of Pilgrim Church. Please come with two choices of a mentor on Sunday, Nov. 4.
