Most of all I will be writing, working on finishing the first draft, and beginning to revise, a book about 12 step spirituality and recovery and what these things might teach us as people of faith, about being human and serving God. The author Annie Dillard wrote that the average books takes ten years to write from start to finish! I'm hoping to beat that average.

So, you give me the gift of time: to do that which I absolutely love and feel called to do by God. To write. I will miss you. I will pray for you. And, God willing, I will return at the end of summer ready again, to continue our mutual ministry. THANK YOU. THANK YOU. THANK YOU!

Moderator's Message

I play a game I enjoy very much with friends every Saturday and occasionally during a weeknight if we can arrange it. The game is called Ultimate; it's played with a Frisbee - the only actual piece of equipment needed to play. Maybe you are familiar with the sport. If not, I can describe it best as a cross between soccer, since it's played on a soccer field, and football, because the object is to pass into an end-zone instead of some goal.

The exercise is fantastic, and there is plenty of strategy to the game as well. So it provides both physical and mental challenges to all players. Another amazing aspect to the game is that many different age groups and skills levels can all play the game - together. It's quite a thing to see a 60 year old compete competitively against a 19 year old - and it happens!

One of the toughest situations in the game occurs when a team has the disc very close to the goal line. There can be a lot of people in a very tight space. The thrower only has 10 seconds in which to take some action, and that goes by very quickly. The temptation is often to try to force a throw or to try something risky in order to score. If the risky move fails, the disc drops, the other team takes possession, and everyone feels terrible.

There is a simple, humble solution to this situation, but it takes self-control. The answer is to look for a short, easy backward pass. It's a simple "give and go" play. And it works almost every time it's tried. It creates space, resets the clock, and gives the new thrower several new, easier angles.

We played a game the other night, and I came away thinking about the "give and go." It seems almost a perfect metaphor for service and thinking of others.

When we, in life, humble ourselves, and think of others, we almost always benefit personally. Maybe we come to realize that, in helping others, we are grateful for the blessings we enjoy. Perhaps we come to appreciate how giving to others, provides us with the opportunity to stop thinking about ourselves for a little while. How nice is that! Finally, it proves that when we stop focusing on just ourselves the world is a little better place to live.

Like the "give and go" pass in Ultimate, the practice of service to others requires humility, self-control, and dedication to something bigger than ourselves. It works every time it's tried.

June 16th is Trinity Sunday, a day to celebrate our understanding of God as three persons, yet one being. Father, Son and Holy Spirit, distinct from each other, but also one and the same.

Now if God created man and woman in His image, He must be as much Mother as Father, so is that 4 in 1? Also, if Jesus was His Son, then He must be younger than God, and so couldn't be one and the same. This is what was going through my mind at age 15 during religious knowledge class at Newbridge College in Ireland.

When I arrived at that Catholic boarding school in Ireland I was quickly immersed in it's own trinity: Religion, Education, Rugby. I learned the 'Our Father' the 'Hail Mary', and the 'Glory Be', and developed a strong relationship with God. That is until about 4 years later when Father Flanagan tried to explain the Holy Trinity. He lost me. God lost me. At 15 it just made no sense.

Little did I know this same conflict took place between followers of Arius (a Lybian priest) and those of Athanasius (an Egyptian bishop). It was the main topic of discussion at the First Council of Nicaea in 325 (in modern day Turkey). I understand it is also what lead a few brave souls to march back down the hill in Sherborn and re-open Pilgrim Church not so many years ago.

A Music Editorial

Recently I was clearing and cleaning out my office desk in preparation for getting a different one (we are switching desks around – kind of a musical chairs. We're hopeful everyone will end up with a desk...). In the process I checked out a folder that had 'historical' things in it. Amongst the treasures was a Chancel Choir list from February 1993 – 26 years ago. The list contained 29 names. Of those 29, nine I know of have died. Of that list, four are still active in the choir. The rest have moved away (some moved before they died).

Pilgrim Church always has been a somewhat transient church. Certainly, in the years I've been here there has been a lot of coming and going; people get transferred into the area by their company, they join a church for a few years and then they are transferred out to another

part of the country. It's the nature of this church –has been for a long while and probably always will be.

So, what does that do to our Chancel Choir membership? Our present choir list contains 15 members; basically, half of what it was 26 years ago. Our church membership has stayed pretty much the same – in the 350 to 400 range – yet, the choir has dropped by half. These 15 are very loyal; if they are in town, they are at rehearsal and the Sunday service. But, it has gotten to the point that if anyone is going to be gone for a Sunday, their section suffers unduly because there are so few in it. For a church of Pilgrim's size, it is not unreasonable to expect eight to ten percent of the congregation to be active in the choir. We were slightly under 10 percent 26 years ago; we're not anywhere near that now.

While it's very gratifying to hear comments like "the choir sounded wonderful today"; "I loved the anthem you did today", etc., **unless things improve soon**, **there will be no choir**. Aging has taken several members out in recent years; they just can't do it anymore. And, as mentioned above, others have moved away or died. Very few of the present members are under the age of 65.

When a new music director is hired, s/he is given a list of responsibilities for the position — a job description. It can include directing the various choirs, playing the organ/piano for services, maintaining the music libraries, keeping instruments in proper working order, presenting 'special' music periodically with orchestra, etc. What doesn't happen and needs to, is that the prospective candidate must hand the congregation a 'job description'. If you, the congregation, want 'special' music, weekly anthems, etc., **YOU need to provide the personnel to do this**. It doesn't happen automatically — it takes a commitment from members of the congregation. No Fairy Godmother is going to do it for you.

Is it a commitment? Of course it is. Anything worth having/doing usually involves a commitment, there's no getting around it. What's the time like, spent in rehearsals and singing at services? **Ask the choir members.** While I try to make rehearsals 'fun' and meaningful, you'll have to ask those who are there what they think. The point is, *there are any number of people in the pews* who could very easily give up the pleasures of Thursday night television, come to rehearsal and interact with a very special bunch of people. Many of you sang in high school and college choruses and glee clubs, so you've had experience. **You're needed** – **NOW**.

(Rehearsals resume on September 5^{th} – put it on your calendar so you won't forget.)
