After seven years of advocacy by many, FINALLY the language requiring some families to prove they are "living in a place unfit for human habitation" before gaining access to the Commonwealth shelter system... That language is gone!!

Thank you, Pilgrim Church, for all the post cards signed over those seven years. For the past seven years we have advocated for this change. The legislature and the governor heard you and many others! Now, several hundred families a year will no longer have to meet that dangerous requirement.

Another of our major priorities: increased funding to support unaccompanied youth—the most vulnerable among us-- has been passed and signed into law!

In addition, this year the governor joined the budget Conference Committee on increasing funding for two major homelessness prevention programs: MRVP (Mass Rental Voucher Program) and RAFT (Residential Assistance for Families in Transition). Keeping families housed is one goal on which we agree.

These are major wins for the homeless and their advocates and, Pilgrim Church, you helped make them happen. Well done. Amen.

Our Whole Lives

plores information, values, and the communication skills necessary to make responsible and healthy decisions about one's sexuality in the context of faith. Confirmation

At weekly supper meetings eighth graders in the Pilgrim Church family will review the essential elements of our faith and explore what it means to be a Christian through reading assignments, writing exercises and group discussion led by staff and volunteers. Seasoned with games, music and fun with friends, the central purpose of the classes is preparing students to make an informed choice to become full members of Pilgrim Church, United Church of Christ, by confirming their commitment to the promises of baptism. Each confirmation class usually has a few students, not previously baptized, who are baptized during class time in a meaningful, low-key atmosphere.

An important feature of confirmation is the opportunity to develop a mentoring relationship with an adult member of our congregation. Confirmands and mentors share four activities of their choice related to living a Christian life – past experiences have included attending a Holy Week worship service, baking bread for communion, and attending a gospel concert. Mentors attend the last class of each month with their confirmands to share their faith stories and reflect on shared activities. Additionally, mentors will help with one class during the four months of confirmation. Mentors and confirmands also go on an overnight retreat with church leaders. Some students have a clear idea whom they would like to ask to be a mentor; others seek suggestions from staff. In either case, just remember that mentors must be members of Pilgrim Church.



Fall is nearly here and as the church returns to a regular worship schedule, the Chancel Choir returns to a regular rehearsal schedule. Choral music is an important component of worship at Pilgrim Church for most of the congregation; in many churches it has died out through apathy. If the congregation wants a viable choir, members have to step up to the plate and sing.

There are many singers in the Pilgrim Church congregation who could be volunteering to sing. Thursday night rehearsals generally go from 7:30 to 8:45 or so. Sunday mornings the group meets at 9 AM for a short rehearsal before the service. It is a commitment – anything worth doing usually is – but for the singers, an enjoyable one.

Information Meeting for Oberammergau Passion Play Trip



The trip to Southern Germany and Northeastern Italy planned around the Oberammergau Passion Play is fast approaching. Although sponsored by Pilgrim Church, anyone may register for the trip, scheduled for May 13-24, 2020; the cost is \$4998 per person, double occupancy. A Land-Only price and single-supplement price are available. The price includes airfare, hotels, transportation, guides, entrance fees, all breakfasts, three dinners, ticket for the Passion Play, and all tips, including bus drivers and the tour guide. Not included are lunches, remaining

dinners and whatever trinkets and souvenirs you can't live without. The tour leaves Boston on May 13 for Munich, Germany. The performance date for the Passion Play is Sunday, May 17. The return flight will be from Milan, Italy, to Boston. Brochures are available in the church narthex and the church office, and for further information, please contact

David Tiedman, tour coordinator, at 508-655-1667.

An informational meeting will be held on Sunday, September 29, at 7 PM at the church. At that time the itinerary will be outlined, questions discussed, etc. An initial payment of \$1800 per person is due by November 15. After that, late registrants may be subject to a higher price. Travel insurance is available. Should you wish to, you can plan a pre- or post- trip extension on your own. You can notify the tour company in writing and they will schedule your airline tickets accordingly. There may be an extra fee for this.

The Oberammergau Passion Play originated in the 17th century as a pledge to God by the people of Oberammergau to perform the Passion every 10 years if they could be spared from the plague. With few interruptions – 1940, for example, because of WW II – it has been done every 10 years since then. Only residents of Oberammergau can be in the play; rehearsals begin at least a year in advance, and it is an honor to be in the cast. From May to October about 100 performances are done and performances are generally sold out, as the play has become world-famous. Passion Plays recount the final week of Christ's life on earth – Holy Week. In the United States, there is one done in the Black Hills of South Dakota every summer that has become well known; there may be others around the country. None have attained the fame of the Oberammergau play.

The Stewardship Campaign-It is changing! It is the same! It is some of each.

The Stewardship Committee is gearing up for the Stewardship Campaign for 2020. The Campaign will have some changes.

- The biggest change is that we are getting underway earlier than ever before. Stewardship Sunday, the day we start the campaign asking for your pledge in the offering plate, will be on October 20th. Almost a month earlier than in the past. "Why" you might ask. The answer is, so we don't run so quickly into Thanksgiving and Christmas time when most folk's thoughts are not likely to be on pledging.
- In place of personal testimonials on Sundays leading up to Pledge Sunday, we will be asking four different church committees to speak to how they spend our resources and how that spending connects to the 20/20 Committee focus on "Welcome", "Community", "Service", "Christian Education", and "Worship."
- With the help of church staff, we will introduce "on-line" donations on the revised Church Website as a new way to fulfill your pledge. We might even have "on-line" pledging, but that is proving a bit harder to do. Stay tuned.
- The "Giving Chart" of years past will grow up. Plans are being made following Pledge Sunday to have a large poster in the vestibule every Sunday with stick-on paper "bricks", each representing a pledge that has been made. Yes, it will also be in the bulletin almost every Sunday until January, and in the monthly newsletter articles. But it will look a bit different. The Campaign will remain the same.
- The Campaign will ask, and has always asked, that you give thoughtful consideration to how you want to support Pilgrim Church and all its various activities, its local and worldwide missions.
- The Campaign will ask that you make a pledge, tell us in advance, how you will financially support the church over the coming year so that we can plan and continue to operate in a fiscally responsible manner.
- The Campaign will ask you to pledge generously so that Pilgrim Church may remain a vibrant, dynamic, and engaging church serving our congregation, the local community, and the world.
- The Campaign will end when the January 2020 Parish Board meeting votes to recommend a balanced budget, based on your pledges, to be presented to the congregation at the annual meeting in February.

SHERBORN BOY SCOUTS TROOP 1

Troop 1 had a busy summer.

In June, the troop welcomed six new Webelo scouts to the troop. Due to conflict the cross over ceremony was moved to September.

In July, 10 senior scouts and 3 adult leaders attended the Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico. Philmont is a national BSA High Adventure Base that is located in the Rocky Mountains. The crew started their adventure with 2 days in Colorado Spring to adjust to the higher altitude and toured the Garden of the Gods park, the U.S. Olympic Training Center, the U.S. Air Force Academy, went whitewater rafting and toured the Royal Gorge Bridge. The scouts then went to Philmont to embark on their 12 day trek in the beautiful mountains of New Mexico. The crew was busy with hiking and activities including rock climbing, musket shooting, tomahawk throwing, 3D archery and fly fishing. During the trek the boys hiked over 60 miles and summited several peaks including Mount Philips (El. 11,600) and the Tooth of Time (El. 9,000). A special thanks to our youth leaders Oren Weimeyer (Crew Leader), Bradley Peterson (Chaplain's Aide) and Jack Worcester (Wilderness Guide) and the adult advisors - Doug Peterson, Jason Worcester and David Kapilian.

In August, eleven scouts ranging from 6th to 10th grade spent a week lakeside at the Camp Yawgoog in Rhode Island. The three first-time campers spent time earning Swimming and First aid Merit Badges while many of the returning scouts took advantage of the opportunity to learn and refine their techniques at the Rifle range and the climbing walls. Four scouts spent the week taking an intense 6 day waterfront Life Guard course and learned a variety of life saving techniques. When not enriching their knowledge of all things BSA Scouts, the boys were busy competing with other troops from MA, RI, and NY in games of basketball and corn hole, continuing their reign as champs on the court. This is the second year in a row that the scouts have traveled to Camp Yawgoog and all agree it was a great return trip in no small part to the leadership of the Senior Patrol Leader. Big shout out to Alex K. for a super job!
