

For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD, "PLANS TO PROSPER YOU and not to harm you, plans to give you HOPE and FUTURE" JEREMIAH 29:11 One of the activities I spent time on during my sabbatical this summer was talking to other pastors – my friends and colleagues in the church – about how they and the folks they serve were feeling about the days ahead. The answers were **almost always the same. It's a great** challenge right now to do church as **we've always done. We are trying to** change. We are ever hopeful about **tomorrow, because God's work and** love is so needed in the world right now.

To live in challenging times. To live up to those times. To keep on keeping on as the Church.

As the 2020 Task Force continues our work of discerning with God and church members and friends, just where God is calling us in the days ahead, that's the spirit I pray all of us might have. Realism about the changing world we face. Commitment to doing what we do best, what makes Pilgrim Church, Pilgrim: Worship, Community, Service, Christian Teaching and Welcome. (The five core values the church identified in interviews last fall.) Excitement about how we might offer God's love to one another and the world in new ways. I am convinced if we stay on this path, and trust in God, we will be faithful.

Here's an update on our 2020 process and a timeline of what's ahead:

- 1. We've gathered information, opinions and ideas from many folks and committees and the leadership in the church, but are still ready to hear your thoughts about our work and direction. Which of our five core values is most important to you and why? Why do you claim Pilgrim as your church home? What as a church could we do better, differently?
- 2. We are gathering this fall, information from the communities and people we serve, by interviewing folks who don't go to church and community leaders, i.e. in town government, in the schools, social service agencies, etc. We ask: what are the spiritual and social needs of the area that need to be met? What can Pilgrim Church do to help?
- 3. We are beginning to formulate programs and initiatives to recommend to the congregation at Annual Meeting in February of 2020. These will be circulated before then to allow everyone to think and pray on these ideas.

- 4. We are thinking about how to better "brand" the church: how can we clearly and creatively describe to the world who we are as God's people and what we do as God's people.
- 5. We are working on raising the visibility of our core values right here at church, through signage, banners, the website, etc. I will preach on the core values this fall too.

We've got a lot of work still to do, but most important we need all of us – the congregation – to support and be a part of our 2020 plans and hopes. We need your prayers. We need your energy and commitment. We need your openness and curiosity. We need YOU!

Exciting times. But that's how it's always been, always is, when God seeks to change us and the world for the better. Be in touch. You can contact any of us on the committee with your thoughts. God does have plans for us to prosper. May we trust this. May we embody this.

A massive fire broke out in downtown Natick in the early morning hours of July 23rd. It is believed to have started in a Chinese restaurant and quickly burned through the entire block of neighboring stores.

Firefighters from 17 communities arrived to fight the flames that started at about 1:30 am. Acting Natick Fire Chief Dan Dow said it was the largest fire he had ever seen in his 24 years with the Natick Fire Department. It took more than 12 hours to finally bring the flames under control. Eventually, the decision was made to demolish all of the affected stores just to make sure that the fire was quenched.



In the aftermath, there was heartache. While no one was physically injured, and everyone was grateful for that, there were several businesses destroyed, lives turned upside down, and total uncertainly for those trying to predict their futures.

I am sure that for many, it was one of the worst days of their lives.

But even as the smoke still rose to the sky, there were ample displays of goodness and kindness for all to see. The Red Cross was on the scene to assist the multiple fire fighters. Neighbors also rushed to assist those in need. A fund was quickly established to help all displaced business owners.

In the days after the fire, a large fence was erected around the property, and many people stopped by to take a look. When I walked by, I was struck by something I found amazing. Directly next to the blackened remains of the building stood a tree. It had obviously been exposed to the fearsome flames all night and into the next morning, but there it stood. A green sign of life standing proudly, defiantly even, directly in front of the incinerated remains.

For me, the actions of the neighbors, and the presence of that tree prove to me once again that in God's world good can and often does emerge from bad. It is our job to look for the good, and to fully grasp its significance when we see it. And we thank God for all the goodness HE created and creates every day.



Plan ahead for the Children's Christmas Tableau


The Children's Christmas Tableau is a long standing and beloved tra-

MUSIC EDITORIAL by David Tiedman



Last Spring, while clearing and cleaning out my office desk in preparation for getting a different one, I checked out a folder that had 'historical' things in it. Amongst the treasures was a Chancel Choir list from February 1993 – 26 years ago. The list contained 29 names. Of those 29, nine I know of have died. Of that list, four are still active in the choir. The rest have moved away (some moved before they died).

Pilgrim Church always has been a somewhat transient church. Certainly, in the years I've been here there has been a lot of coming and going; people get transferred into the area by their company, they join a church for a few years and then they are transferred out to another part of the country. It's the nature of this church –has been for a long while and probably always will be.

So, what does that do to our Chancel Choir membership? Our present choir list contains 16 members; of which one is paid, basically, half of what it was 26 years ago. Our church membership has stayed pretty much the same – in the 350 to 400 range – yet, the choir has dropped by half. These 15 are very loyal; if they are in town, they are at rehearsal and the Sunday service. But, it has gotten to the point that if any-one is going to be gone for a Sunday, their section suffers unduly because there are so few in it. For a church of Pilgrim's size, it is not unreasonable to expect eight to ten percent of the congregation to be active in the choir. We were slightly under 10 percent 26 years ago; we're not anywhere near that now.

While it's very gratifying to hear comments like "the choir sounded wonderful today"; "I loved the anthem you did today", etc., unless things improve soon, <u>there will be no choir</u>. Aging has taken several members out in recent years; they just can't do it anymore. And, as mentioned above, others have moved away or died. Very few of the present members are under the age of 65.

When a new music director is hired, s/he is given a list of responsibilities for the position – a job description. It can include directing the various choirs, playing the organ/piano for services, maintaining the music libraries, keeping instruments in proper working order, presenting 'special' music periodically with orchestra, etc. What doesn't happen and needs to, is that the prospective candidate must hand the congregation a 'job description'. If you, the congregation, want 'special' music, weekly anthems, etc., <u>YOU need to provide the personnel to do this</u>. It doesn't happen automatically – it takes a commitment from members of the congregation. No Fairy Godmother is going to do it for you.

Is it a commitment? Of course it is. Anything worth having/doing usually involves a commitment, there's no getting around it. What's the time like, spent in rehearsals and singing at services? Ask the choir members. While I try to make rehearsals 'fun' and meaningful, you'll have to ask those who are there what they think. The point is, *there are any number of people in the pews* who could very easily give up the pleasures of Thursday night television, come to rehearsal and interact with a very special bunch of people. Many of you sang in high school and college choruses and glee clubs, so you've had experience. You're needed—NOW.

The Stewardship Campaign It is changing! It is the same! It is some of each.

The Stewardship Committee is gearing up for the Stewardship Campaign for 2020.

The Campaign will have some changes.

- The biggest change is that we are getting underway earlier than ever before. Stewardship Sunday, the day we start the campaign asking for your pledge in the offering plate, will be on October 20th, almost a month earlier than in the past. "Why?" you might ask. The answer is, so we don't run so quickly into Thanksgiving and Advent when most folk's thoughts are not likely to be on pledging.
- In place of personal testimonials on Sundays leading up to Pledge Sunday, we will be asking three different church committees to speak to how they spend our resources and how that spending connects to the 20/20 Committee focus on "Welcome", "Community", "Service", "Christian Education", and "Worship."
- With the help of church staff, we will introduce "on-line" donations on the revised Church Website as a new way to fulfill your pledge. We might even have "on-line" pledging, but that is proving a bit harder to do. Stay tuned.
- The "Giving Chart" of years past will grow up. Plans are being made following Pledge Sunday to have a large poster in the vestibule every Sunday with different colored "bricks", each representing a pledge that has been made. Yes, it will also be in the bulletin most every Sunday until January, and in the monthly newsletter articles. But it will look a bit different.

The Campaign will remain the same.

- The Campaign will ask, and has always asked, that you give thoughtful consideration to how you want to support Pilgrim Church and all its various activities, its local and worldwide missions.
- The Campaign will ask that you make a pledge, tell us in advance, how you will financially support the church over the coming year so that we can plan and continue to operate in a fiscally responsible manner.
- The Campaign will ask you to pledge generously so that Pilgrim Church may remain a vibrant, dynamic, and engaging church serving our congregation, the local community, and the world.
- The Campaign will end when the January 2020 Parish Board meeting votes to recommend a balanced budget, based on your pledges, to be presented to the congregation at the annual meeting in February.

Information Meeting for Oberammergau Passion Play Trip



The trip to Southern Germany and Northeastern Italy planned around the Oberammergau Passion Play is fast approaching. Although sponsored by Pilgrim Church, anyone may register for the trip, scheduled for May 13-24, 2020; the cost is \$4998 per person, double occupancy. A Land-Only price and singlesupplement price are available. The price includes airfare, hotels, transportation, guides, entrance fees, all breakfasts, three dinners, ticket for the Passion Play, and all tips, including bus drivers and the tour guide. Not included are lunches, remaining **dinners and whatever trinkets and souvenirs you can't live with-**

out. The tour leaves Boston on May 13 for Munich, Germany. The performance date for the Passion Play is Sunday, May 17. The return flight will be from Milan, Italy, to Boston. Brochures are available in the church narthex and the church office, and for further information, please contact David Tiedman, tour coordinator, at 508-655-1667.

An informational meeting will be held on Sunday, September 29, at 7 PM at the church. At that time the itinerary will be outlined, questions discussed, etc. An initial payment of \$1800 per person is due by November 15. After that, late registrants may be subject to a higher price. Travel insurance is available. Should you wish to, you can plan a pre- or post- trip extension on your own. You can notify the tour company in writing and they will schedule your airline tickets accordingly. There may be an extra fee for this.

The Oberammergau Passion Play originated in the 17th century as a pledge to God by the people of Oberammergau to perform the Passion every 10 years if they could be spared from the plague. With few interruptions – 1940, for example, because of WW II – it has been done every 10 years since then. Only residents of Oberammergau can be in the play; rehearsals begin at least a year in advance, and it is an honor to be in the cast. From May to October about 100 performances are done and performances are generally sold out, as the play has become world-famous. Passion Plays recount the final week of Christ's life on earth – Holy Week. In the United States, there is one done in the Black Hills of South Dakota every summer that has become well known; there may be others around the country. None have attained the fame of the Oberammergau play.

The Miracle Kitchen in Framingham and supported by the United Way is an evolution from the former Salvation Army dinner that the Pilgrim Church community supported for many years. But one Wednesday evening, every three months, Pilgrim Church volunteers return to plate the three courses (salad, entrée and dessert), serve and clear. Volunteers greet and chat. We smile and nod. And we say "God bless" back.
